

## **SPEAKERS' BIOGRAPHIES**

### **Rosemary Deem**

Rosemary Deem is Dean of History and Social Sciences and Professor of Higher Education Management at Royal Holloway, University of London. She is also Visiting Professor at Bristol and Leicester University. Until January 2009 she was Professor of Education and Research Director for Faculty of Social Sciences and Law at the University of Bristol. An Academician of the UK Academy of Social Sciences, Rosemary is a sociologist who has also worked at Loughborough, York, the Open and Lancaster Universities and the former North Staffordshire Polytechnic. At Lancaster University she was Head of the Department of Educational Research (1992-4), Dean of Social Sciences (1999-4) and Founding Director of the University Graduate School (1998-2000). She was director of the UK Learning and Teaching Support Network Education Subject Centre ESCalate from 2001-2004, a UK Education Research Assessment Exercise panellist in 1996, 2001 and 2008, has twice chaired the British Sociological Association and was Vice-Chair of the Society for Research into Higher Education from 2007-2009. From 2001-2005 she was joint editor of the Blackwells international journal *The Sociological Review* and is currently on the Editorial Board of *Studies in Higher Education*, *Equal Opportunities International*, *Higher Education* and *Higher Education Quarterly*. She has just completed co-directing (with colleagues from Cardiff Business School) a UK Economic and Social Research Council funded project on change agency and leadership development in the UK public services. ### **Jurgen Enders**

Jürgen Enders is Professor at the School of Management and Governance and Director of the Center for Higher Education Policy Studies (CHEPS) at the University of Twente, The Netherlands. He is one of the leaders of the research program on the 'Governance of Innovation, Technology, Higher Education, and Research' at the Institute for Governance Studies (IGS). His research interests are in the areas of innovation, science and the political sociology of education; the governance and management of higher education, research and knowledge transfer; organizational change in higher education; higher education and the world of work; and the academic profession. He is member of the editorial board of the book series 'Higher Education Dynamics' and the journal 'Higher Education'. He has served as a member of the board and Secretary of the Consortium of Higher Education Researchers (CHER) and is a member of the German Educational Council, the Advisory Board for the Swiss Science and Technology Council and the Dutch Association of Universities. He has also served as a reviewer to the German excellence initiative and is a reviewer to the Dutch Research Council and the German Research Council. Jürgen Enders has been a visiting scholar at the University of California, Berkeley, USA; the Foundation Nationale de Sciences Politiques in Paris, France, the Social Science Research Center (WZB), Berlin, Germany and the University of Beijing, China,. He has written and (co-)edited 12 books and published more than 90 articles in books and journals such as *Higher Education*, *Higher Education Policy*, *Leviathan*, *Public Administration*, *Rassegna Italiana di Sociologia*, *Scientometrics*. His current research projects include large scale comparative investigations supported by the European Science Foundation, the European Research Framework Programme, the European Commission, the Ford Foundation, the Dutch Research Council, the German Research Council and the German Academe of the Sciences.

### **Roger King**

Roger King is Visiting Research Professor at the Centre for Higher Education Research and Information at the UK Open University and Research Associate at the Centre for the Analysis of Risk and

Regulation at the London School of Economics and Political Science. He was recently Visiting Professor at Griffith University, Australia and at Queensland University of Technology, Australia . He also has been Visiting Fellow at the Association of Commonwealth Universities, is on the Board of the Observatory on Borderless Higher Education and a consultant to Universities UK on private higher education. Previously he was Vice Chancellor of the University of Lincoln (1989-2001) and founding Chairman of the Institute for Learning and Teaching (1997-2001) (now The Higher Education Academy). He has served on the British Council's Committee for Higher Education and its Executive Committee (as Deputy Chairman) and on various committees for Universities UK, including its Executive Committee. He is Chairman of Hobsons' Advisory Committee for its International Students Enquiry Management System for UK universities, and is on the Board of Trustees at Regent's College, London, a not-for-profit private international higher education college. His recent research focuses on the socio-political conditions for creativity and innovation (see 'Governing Knowledge Globally: policy internationalism, global science and the open society', presented at the Centre for the Study of Higher Education, University of Melbourne April 2009, accessible at [http://www.cshe.unimelb.edu.au/research/res\\_seminars.html](http://www.cshe.unimelb.edu.au/research/res_seminars.html)). Among recent publications include The University in the Global Age (Palgrave Macmillan, 2004); The State, Democracy and Globalization (Palgrave Macmillan, 2004); The Regulatory State in an Age of Governance (Palgrave Macmillan, 2007) and Governing Universities Globally: Organizations, Regulation and Rankings (2009) by Edward Elgar. Under preparation is a Handbook of Globalization and Higher Education (with Simon Marginson, University of Melbourne, and Rajani Naidoo, University of Bath) for Edward Elgar publishers. He is also Series Co-Editor of the Palgrave Macmillan Series 'Universities into the Twenty-First Century'.
