Information on Presentation formats and guidelines for presenters and delegates

Conference formats

The SRHE Annual Research Conference 2010 offers paper presentations and discussions in a number of formats; - plenary sessions; individual paper presentations; discussion workshops and symposia.

The following guidance on the plans for each of these different sessions will help both presenters and delegates to know what to expect from a session and to prepare and plan their conference accordingly.

Plenary sessions

There are three keynote plenary sessions. Each is planned on the basis of offering scholarly input and the opportunity for discussion and debate.

Immediately after each keynote address the conference will divide into smaller discussion groups. In this way we aim to facilitate more interactive debate amongst delegates and take more out of these keynote sessions than can be achieved in a short formal Q&A session. Discussion groups will take place in each of the 12 breakout rooms and delegates are asked to attend the session which corresponds with the first letter of their surname as shown on the timetable. This is how the groups have been designated in order to have a similar number in each group and a good mix of research backgrounds.

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Individual paper presentations

Individual papers will be presented in 30 minute sessions and presenters are asked to plan their contributions to allow good time for discussion and debate after their formal presentation. Presenters are also asked to plan their use of powerpoint slides sensibly given the time available and a guide of 5 slides is recommended, dependent of course on the nature of the research being presented.

Each individual session will be chaired by an appointed individual whose role is to manage the use of time effectively and ensure that there is good time for discussion in which all participants at the session contribute.

Abstracts for all presentations are included in the Conference programme and full papers for all presentations are on the conference website and available on a CD-Rom at the start of the conference.

Discussion workshops

The abstract review process identified papers which could be grouped together for discussion and thus allow space in the programme for a wide and varied range of research work to be presented. Workshops have been allocated in 30 minute (two papers) and 60 minute (3-4 papers) sessions. Presenters in these workshops have been asked to limit their presentations to an overview of their work (using probably no more than 2 powerpoints if desired) to allow good time for discussion. Delegates attending workshops are encouraged to review the abstracts and full papers in advance to get the best value form these discussions.

Each discussion workshop will be chaired by an appointed individual whose role is to manage the use of time effectively between all the presenters and ensure that there is good time for discussion in which all participants at the session contribute.

Symposia

There are 13 symposia sessions. Each symposia has a rationale and a series of individual presentations and all have their own chair or convenor in charge of the presentations and some also have a discussant to facilitate good debate after the presentations.

Submission of Powerpoint presentations: Deadline 5 December 2010.

In order to make it easier for presenters, conference staff and technicians and ensure a smooth conference, powerpoint presentations will be preloaded in the rooms where they are listed for presentation. All presenters are asked to bring a back up copy of presentation material on a memory stick.
