#### A WORD FROM THE SOCIETY'S DIRECTOR

Financial year August 2012 – July 2013 Reporting year January 2013 – December 2013



Operating in an academic environment in which quality of writing and precision of expression are core skills, avoiding the use of cliché is always preferable. However, looking back at the past year, two seem unavoidable. The Society does continue to go "from strength to strength" and the Society does "punch well above its weight" in terms of what it delivers against an annual turnover of around £700K.

The driving strategic aims behind our activities in the past year have been extending global reach and having impact. There is no real value in sustaining research into higher education if we don't ensure that it is not only disseminated widely, but also widely discussed and critiqued. The outputs of research into higher education must be shared, understood and communicated across a wide spectrum of researchers, influencers and policy makers.

The Society has accordingly increased the range and scale of our dissemination events and we have reached out beyond our core membership to draw in other interested groups and individuals. Our activities now attract participants from across the disciplinary spectrum and we anticipate that interdisciplinarity will be an increasingly important feature in all that we do. Our means of communications and connectivity encompasses a publications portfolio of journals and books and an extensive events programme of research seminars and network meetings as well as our two highly regarded annual conferences. These activities, aligned with our range of annual research grants, now have a coherence which is forming the basis of our work on research and knowledge exchange.

Our goal in the year ahead is to support these activities with even greater use of online resources, facilitating more direct and immediate engagement with researchers globally and building closer relationships with our members internationally. Initial steps include developing a micro-blogging presence on Twitter and preparations for fuller blogging

activity via www.srheblog.com.

In June 2013, the Society's Governing Council members invested a day in strategic planning. The aim was to take a very detailed look at all the Society's activities and establish a set of objectives and priorities to be addressed over the next 5 years in terms of:

- Developing a research strategy for SRHE 2020
- Aiming for Impact
- International Engagement
- Engaging with other disciplines
- Diversity
- Building capacity and understanding the student experience
- Using new media and digital resources
- Supporting the SRHE Membership
- Society finances and scope for investment in research and dissemination

Ideas and proposals from this day have helped shape and direct the Society's future priorities.

2015 will be an important year for the Society, marking the Society's 50th anniversary. Through events and new publications, we intend to showcase 50 years of research into higher education, assessing impact, highlighting seminal works, reviewing policy and mapping the changing landscape of higher education over these five decades.

In preparing for this anniversary year we plan to draw on contributions from across the generations of researchers; inviting contributions from those who were engaged with research into higher education at the beginning in the early decades, and have seen it all before, to those newer and early career researchers who bring fresh eyes, energy and verve to the process of understanding the value of high quality teaching and high quality research.

Overall membership is up around 10% in comparison with this point last year, and currently hovers at around the 700 mark.

#### Membership by gender

A brief analysis of the gender of current members is shown in the table below.

It is interesting to note the high proportion of female student members, which correlates with the gender balance of participants we see at our professional development workshops, where over 75% are female.

#### **Members/Non Members at Conference 2013**

Of the delegates attending the Annual Research Conference, 53% were members, 47% non-members. For the Newer Researchers' Conference, 48% were members, with 52% being non-members. We hope that this provides for a productive balance in terms of providing a forum for both non-members/first-time attenders and members/regular attenders.

#### **SRHE Annual Research Conference**

11-13 December 2013, Celtic Manor, Newport, South Wales, UK

The 2013 Annual Research Conference brought together 360 delegates from 35 countries to consider current issues in Higher Education research. 225 papers were presented, along with 11 symposia. *Research Directions* seminars were run twice by SRHE Network Convenors, responding to delegate feedback and building more interactive elements into the Conference.

The international/national split at Conference this year was 55% UK and 45% international; a significant shift this year (In 2012, 70% of delegates were UK based). The Conference is now seen globally as part of the international conference circuit, not just a UK event open to others.


In addition, the **Newer Researchers conference** was held on 10 December 2013 and featured a keynote address from **Professor Mike Neary** from the University of Lincoln entitled *Student as Producer: Radicalising Curriculum Development and Institutional Change in Higher Education.* 

With almost 100 delegates from 20 different countries, this conference provided a valuable opportunity for newer researchers to share and discuss their work with peers in the Higher Education research community in a supportive and developmental environment.

The research poster competition at this event was a particular highlight, with over 30 posters displayed, sparking many interesting discussions and providing an excellent basis for networking between all delegates.

Our thanks go to the organising committee of Dr Mark Kerrigan, Dr Sian Lindsay, and Dr Saranne Weller who were once again key to the success of this event.

### 2013 NEWER RESEARCHER PRIZE WINNERS





Dr Jude Fransman from the Institute of Education, University of London was awarded the 2013 Prize for her proposal entitled:

Becoming academic in the digital age: representations of academic identity in the online profiles of Early Career Researchers

Jude joined the Department of Culture, Communication and Media as a postdoctoral researcher in 2011 after a decade's experience as a consultant, research associate and policy analyst for international organisations (including UNESCO and the OECD) in France, Tanzania, South Africa, Vietnam, Thailand and Mexico and following a post as a research associate with the Open University's Institute of Educational Technology.

Her PhD explored the politics of representation in academic and community-based research in/on/with the same migrant community in London. Since then, her postdoctoral research has focused on the performativity of method and the representational potential of different types of research texts. She is particularly interested in the influence of digital resources on the research process. At the Open University, she worked on a project on 'digital scholarship' while at the Institute of Education she has recently concluded a longitudinal study on the digital literacy practices of postgraduate students based on multimodal journaling. Jude also teaches research design, visual methods and social theory at postgraduate and doctoral level.

DR Anne-Sofie Nyström has been awarded the 2013 Prize for her proposal entitled:

Facing potential failure: Men, masculinities, and self-worth protecting strategies in highly competitive learning contexts

Anne-Sofie joined Mälardalen University,
Sweden, as a lecturer in Sociology in autumn
2013. Previously she has been a lecturer at
Uppsala University, Department of Sociology,
following the completion of her PhD on identitynegotiation among privileged young men, upper
secondary schooling and underachievement.
Her research interests are, primarily,
educational inequality and feminist theory,
with focus on boys/men, masculinities and
identity processes in peer-groups.

The SRHE funded project will draw on qualitative methods to explore how male students' self-images and self-worth are negotiated in higher education and, in particular, in an elite program and in relation to potential failure.

Anne-Sofie's thesis was well-received in Swedish news-media and policy debates when published in 2012; among other things she was invited keynote at Include 2012-conference, a national network for widening access to higher education. Prior to her academic career she worked at the Swedish National Agency for Education and Student Union.



All the above events were hosted at the SRHE offices, with the exception of the 26th July event held in Glasgow. A total of around 500 delegates attended these events, of which 70% were (or became) members of the Society.

The programme continues to grow and develop in 2013-14, and further details are available from **www.srhe.ac.uk** 



The Society's turnover is at its highest ever at £666k (against £637k last year). The Society's publications, in particular *Studies in Higher Education* continue to make a significant contribution to the income and reputation of the Society, with a total of over £300k received from periodicals and royalties.

We are beginning to spend from the reserves (now at 739k compared with £766k last year), of which £225k is our semi-permanent contingency fund, leaving potentially £500k as an expendable reserve for special projects over the next few years.

Expenditure has increased to £700k this year (compared with £642k last year), given the increased office rent and running costs and further cost increases remain sustainable given the security of the Society's key source of income from *Studies in Higher Education*. This journal income looks relatively stable to December 2014 given the contractual arrangements in place.

The Society remains comfortably placed to deal not only with ever increasing costs, but also has financial capacity for embarking on further planned activities to the extent of up to say £100k per annum over the next few years. Clearly, this 'additional activity' spending will need to be reviewed when the process for the re-tendering of Studies has been completed by mid-2014.

The thanks of the Treasurer need, as ever, to be recorded to the SRHE Team and the Director Helen Perkins, for the thoughtful and responsible management of the Society's income and expenditure.

Finally, I am pleased to confirm that the SRHE is fully compliant with all requirements stipulated by the Charity Commission, and is thus in possession of a 'clean bill of health' in financial terms for 2012-13.
